
Our aim was not only to educate but also to cultivate an environment of respect, understanding, and appreciation for diverse beliefs and traditions.

#### Arts Council

Formed in October 2023, our enthusiastic Arts Council have already made a positive contribution to the Arts in our school. The purpose of the Arts Council is to give our children a greater opportunity to steer the direction of our Arts provision, engaging them and empowering them to help make decisions that will influence the activities on offer in our setting. They also play an important role in organising and maintaining art equipment and music resources.

Just like our School Council, two members from each class from Y3 to Y6, make up our Arts Council and help to represent and share the views of their classmates at meetings which take place 2-3 times each half term.

This half term the Arts Council are continuing to support Y4 as they prepare for their upcoming musical. They are busy developing video resources to be used by classes; these will include vocal warm ups, top tips for projecting voices and essential theatre vocabulary.

The Arts Council have also made good progress in developing their designs for our new and improved stage area. They have submitted initial design ideas to a graphic designer who will be bringing them to life and helping to streamline their creativity. The next task for the children will be deciding how their design is produced and permanently displayed in our Nether Green Theatre.

#### Music of the Half Term - Samba

Listening to music is fundamental to musical understanding. By learning to listen critically, our children will not only expand their musical horizons but also gain a deeper understanding of how music is constructed and the impact it can have on the listener. Listening to a broad range of music also helps develop other areas of musical activity, including composing and performing.

Therefore, each half term we focus on a 'music of the half term' which is explored through assemblies and further listening opportunities.



This half term, we will be focussing on Samba music. Dan Johnston, our drum teacher and Music Hub Samba band leader, will be inspiring the children with a Samba demonstration; our Y6s will also be sharing some Samba polyrhythm learning from their class music lessons.

#### Language of the Half Term - Japanese

Each term we select a different language for the pupils to learn greetings and basic phrases. We choose languages which represent our school community. At Nether Green, we feel it is important to give bilingual children the chance to demonstrate their language skills as well as having an opportunity to share details of their family's country and culture. Language of the Half-term also allows monolingual English speakers to encounter and learn to speak a variety of languages.

All teachers embrace the selected language of the halfterm and actively encourage the children to say good morning, good afternoon and respond to simple yes/no questions in the given language.

#### Spring 2 - Language of the Term - Japanese

The chosen language for this half-term is Japanese.

#### Safeguarding Top Tip

Many of our children are able to walk to and from school independently and we would like to stress the importance of them being safe on the roads.

It is important that children know how to cross a road safely; **Stop, Look and Listen** before crossing and that they need to check both ways. Lots of our children use the pelican crossings around the school area to help them cross the road more safely; please remind them to check that the cars have stopped before they step out as many drivers continue to drive through amber and even red lights outside school. It is also important that children do not look at their mobile phones whilst they are crossing any road, they need to be fully focused on what they are doing to be safe.

We also want the children to know that playing games near the road and even on the road is extremely dangerous.

We will be giving these messages to our children both in class and in assemblies and hope that you too will support us by reinforcing these messages at home.

#### **Online Safety Top Tip**

Children get lots of messages about online safety in school and at home. It is important that as adults we act as good online role models for them. Children look to the adults around them for guidance and there are lots of things we can do to set a good example:

- Keeping passwords safe
- Turning notifications off sometimes
- Talking about things you read online
- Thinking about what you are sharing

#### Spotlight on the Curriculum - Geography

Our Geography Curriculum aims to inspire our pupils to be curious about the world and to understand their place within it, both in terms of location, their links to other countries and by developing their sense of responsibility to the planet – both locally and globally. Our curriculum is based on the aims and objectives of the National Curriculum, but we aim to take learning further by teaching about sustainability and environmental issues as well.

So far this year, Year 3 have studied the UK – finding out about the individual countries and their physical and human features and the positive impact migration has had on the UK. They also looked at our coastal features and how climate change is contributing to coastal erosion and the effect this is having on communities.

Children in Year 4 compared Athens and London. They compared the physical and human features of each place and studied the climate, food, industry, landscape, government and homes in each place. The enjoyed tasting a Greek salad as part of their Greek Day.

In Year 5, children have been studying what life is like at different latitudes. They first learned why we have lines of longitude and latitude. They compared Tromso – a place in the Arctic Circle – with Sheffield and researched their own choice of places at varying latitudes to compare how climate, activities, food, trade, transport, jobs can vary depending on the latitude at which you live.

Year 6 studied sources of renewable and non-renewable energy. They conducted fieldwork at Endcliffe Park to critically consider whether it would be a suitable location for a solar farm – by considering its impact on local people, businesses and wildlife. They have also studied biomes and focussed on the Rainforest biome in particular, considering what natural resources it has and the negative effects of deforestation.




#### Aqua Fest in Y4!


#### Y4 finish their History Project on the Ancient Romans!

Then, we worked in pairs to create a news report informing people about what happened during the eruption. Finally, we performed them to the class!
