I am immensely grateful to all the staff, parents, volunteers, and the PTA who worked tirelessly to make this event possible.



Language of the Half Term

Each term we select a different language for the pupils to learn greetings and basic phrases in. We choose languages which represent our school community. At Nether Green, we feel it is important to give bilingual children the chance to demonstrate their language skills as well as have opportunity to share details of their family's country and culture. Language of the Half-term also allows monolingual English speakers to encounter and learn to speak a variety of languages.

All teachers embrace the selected language of the half-term and actively encourage the children to say good morning, good afternoon and respond to simple yes/no questions in the given language.

The chosen language for this half-term is Turkish.

There are about 90 - 100 million people in the world who can speak Turkish. It is the official language in Turkey and parts of Cyprus. It is also widely spoken in European countries such as Germany, the Netherlands and France, where there are large Turkish communities.

The letters Q, W and X don't exist in the Turkish language.

Music of the half term

Listening to music is fundamental to musical understanding. By learning to listen critically, our children will not only expand their musical horizons but also gain a deeper understanding of how music is constructed and the impact it can have on the listener. Listening to a broad range of music also helps develop other areas of musical activity, including composing and performing. Therefore, each half term we focus on a 'music of the half term' which is explored through assemblies and further listening opportunities.

This half term, we will be focussing on Country music, exploring a wide range of performers from Dolly Parton to Beyoncé! We will look at the way country music often tells a story and will be linking this to thoughts about transition, as the children begin to think about moving up and moving on to new adventures.



Online Safety Top Tip

Make the time to have a conversation

It is really important to chat with your children on an ongoing basis about staying safe online. Not sure where to begin? These conversation starter suggestions can help.

Ask your children to tell you about the sites they like to visit and what they enjoy doing online. What games do you and your friends like to play online? Can you show me the websites you visit the most? Shall we play your favourite game online together?

Ask them about how they stay safe online. What tips do they have for you, and where did they learn them? What is OK and not OK to share?

Ask them if they know where to go for help. Where can they go to find the safety advice, privacy settings and how to report or block on the services they use?

Think about how you each use the internet.
What more could you do to use the internet together?
Are there activities that you could enjoy as a family?



Safeguarding Top Tip



This year's Drowning Prevention Week (DPW), a campaign, which aims to educate families, carers, teachers, and children about water safety will run from the 15 – 22 June.

In 2022, the UK saw a 46% increase in the number of child drownings, compared to the 5-year average, and in the last 5 years, 119 children accidentally drowned in the UK. No child should drown, and with the right water safety education, accidental drownings are preventable. Therefore, Drowning Prevention week is critical in raising awareness and encouraging the public to enjoy water safely.

Pupils that attend school swimming lessons will be taught how to stay safe in, on and around water. They will experience swimming in clothes and learn a safe self -rescue in different water- based situations.

However, it is important that we continue to educate our children at home.

Spotlight on the Curriculum - Writing



As the school year draws towards the end, it has been fantastic to see the progress that the children have made in their writing. The quality and variety of work that has been produced this year is incredible! The children have created some fantastic work, some of this linked to the wider curriculum, making use of their new knowledge and vocabulary. Other work has been linked to the class book and other narrative stimuli.

Our writing curriculum is designed to develop children's understanding of authorial intent and the purpose of the text type. This allows them to consider their vocabulary choices carefully and to think about how they want their reader to feel, choosing grammar and sentence structure to achieve this.

This half term, the Y3's have written to the new Y2's to tell them what life is really like at Junior School! They are currently creating a narrative inspired by A River by Marc Martin and The Journey by Neil Griffiths and Scott Mann. They are, of course, drawing on their experience of the River Walk!

In Y4, the children have created fantastic non – chronological reports about underwater habitats, linking to their project, How does an Ecosystem work? They have really enjoyed finding out about the creatures that live there and have written some super descriptions.

Y5 are also writing non – chronological reports about life in London during the plague. This piece of work draws on their knowledge from their project, 'What was the Great Plague and how does this compare to the outbreak of Covid 19?' as well as their class book, Raven Boy by Pippa Goodhart. The detail and description in this work really shows the differences in how people lived.

The Y6's have been using the graphic novel, The Arrival by Shaun Tan as the stimulus for their latest piece of writing. The have written emotive narratives and have really impressed everyone with the maturity and quality of their work.
