# Message from the Headteacher

This week, I led our Behaviour and Attitudes assembly and spoke to the children about some important ideas that we're focusing on this half term across the whole school - for both children and staff. We're thinking carefully about the kind of people we are, how we treat others, and how our actions make a difference.

We talked about how small, everyday choices are like planting seeds. I gave the example of someone holding the door open for me on a busy morning - such a small gesture, but it completely lifted my mood. Positive actions like that grow into strong friendships, confidence, and good memories.

We also looked at what it means to do the right thing even when no one's watching, like helping someone out quietly or making a good choice when no one is there to see it. Those moments really show your character. I reminded the children that progress starts with just one step, and it's okay to fall as long as you keep going.

One message that really stuck with us was the idea that smiling and positive energy are contagious. Something as simple as a genuine smile or a kind word can completely change someone's day and it often spreads further than you'd expect.

A big thank you to Mrs Thorlby who led Tuesday's celebration assembly, it was full of energy and left a real buzz across the school. In today's assembly, Miss Bartlett introduced the religion of the half term:

Christianity. She also explained the role of the Pope within the Catholic faith and the impact Pope Francis had as a faith leader. And a special well done to Gabby, Eddie and Aanya, who helped present to parents at the Robinwood information evening. They spoke clearly and confidently and they should be very proud of themselves.

# Music of the half term - Pop

Last half term, the School Council worked hard on developing a suggestion box to give all pupils a voice in shaping school life. The purpose of the box is to allow children to share ideas and suggestions for the School Council to consider. These suggestions will be reviewed and discussed during each School Council meeting.



This half term, the School Council have been busy bringing the project to life. They have constructed the suggestion box, explored how other schools use similar systems, and created a PowerPoint presentation to introduce the box to the pupils at Nether Green Juniors.

In addition to this, the School Council have been focusing on this half term's core value: *Behaviour and Attitudes*. They've been discussing ways they can promote and support this value across the school. Their ideas so far have been thoughtful, insightful, and show great maturity.

Listening to music is fundamental to musical understanding. By learning to listen critically, our children will not only expand their musical horizons but also gain a deeper understanding of how music is constructed and the impact it can have on the listener. Listening to a broad range of music also helps develop other areas of musical activity, including composing and performing. Therefore, each half term we focus on a 'music of the half term' which is explored through assemblies and further listening opportunities.

This half term, we will be focussing on Pop music, specifically exploring 1970s Disco artists – one of the most famous being ABBA – which links to the upcoming Eurovision Song Contest.



# Language of the Half Term - French

Each term we select a different language for the pupils to learn greetings and basic phrases. We choose languages which represent our school community. At Nether Green, we feel it is important to give bilingual children the chance to demonstrate their language skills as well as have opportunity to share details of their family's country and culture. Language of the half-term also allows monolingual English speakers to encounter and learn to speak a variety of languages. All teachers embrace the selected language of the half-term and actively encourage the children to say good morning, good afternoon and respond to simple yes/no questions in the given language.

The chosen language for this half-term is French. French is the official language of more than a dozen countries in Africa, Europe, and North America. The International Red Cross uses French as the official language. French is one of the 6 languages of communication in the UN. Some people claim that French is the language of romance and diplomacy.

# Spotlight on the Curriculum - Design and Technology

#### Design and Technology at NGJS

At Nether Green Junior school, we aim to inspire children through a broad range of practical experiences to create innovative designs. The iterative design process is fundamental and runs throughout the curriculum. This iterative process encourages children to identify real and relevant problems, critically evaluate existing products and then innovate when designing and creating solutions to the problems. Opportunities are provided for children to evaluate key events and individuals who have helped shape the world, showing the real impact of design and technology on the wider environment and helping to inspire children to become the next generation of innovators.

Throughout their time at NGJS, children will become confident and proficient in a variety of areas within Design and Technology including textiles, food and nutrition, materials, mechanics, and electronics. Children will be given the opportunity to develop their interest and curiosity about Design and Technology through a series of lessons offering both skills and knowledge progression.

**Y**<sub>3</sub> – In Autumn term, Y<sub>3</sub> created winter decorations using textiles. They learnt different sewing techniques, designed their own idea, and used felt to sew together their own project. Then, they evaluated their decorations once they had completed it.

Y4 – In Autumn term, Year 4 created nutritious sandwiches where they developed their knowledge of a balanced diet as well as different knife techniques. In Spring term, they explored how to use electronics to create a battery powered light. They researched different types of battery powered lights and considered why they needed to be battery powered depending on their function. They developed the skills of creating an electric circuit, designed their final product and created their final light using recycled materials.

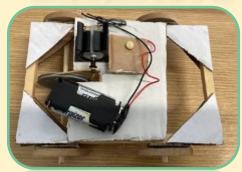
Y5 – In Autumn term, Year 5 focussed on textiles as they created a key ring. First, they researched different types of keyrings. Next, they thought about who their product would be for and designed a keyring appropriate for them. They then developed their sewing skills and evaluated which sewing technique would work best for their product. Finally, they created their keyring and evaluated their final product. In Spring term, they created their own mezze inspired boards where they created their own hummus, tzatziki, and bread. They then had to present their product thoughtfully and evaluate it.

**Y6** – In Autumn term, Year 6 had the challenge of creating their own moving vehicles. They explored different types of vehicles and then were given their specific design brief. They designed, engineered, tested, and evaluated buggies which had different power sources to see which power source was the most effective! In Spring term, they made spring rolls using their knowledge of a nutritious and balanced diet.









# **Learning in Action**

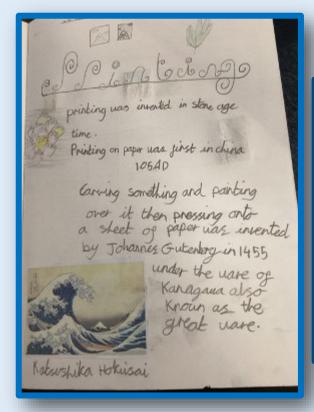
#### Year 3

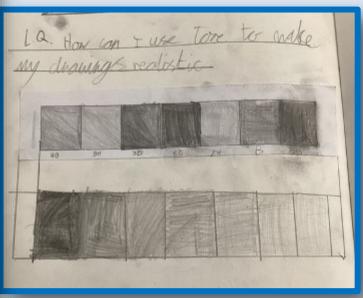


In Art, we have been learning about printing and about how to use different pencils to create tone in drawings.

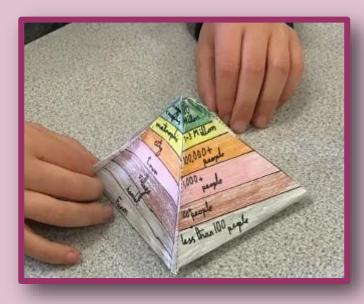
We created our own hierarchy pyramids including lots of information about each one.

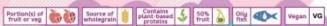
