Language of the Half Term - French

Each term we select a different language for the pupils to learn greetings and basic phrases. We choose languages which represent our school community. At Nether Green, we feel it is important to give bilingual children the chance to demonstrate their language skills as well as have opportunity to share details of their family's country and culture. Language of the half-term also allows monolingual English speakers to encounter and learn to speak a variety of languages. All teachers embrace the selected language of the half-term and actively encourage the children to say good morning, good afternoon and respond to simple yes/no questions in the given language.

The chosen language for this half-term is French. French is the official language of more than a dozen countries in Africa, Europe, and North America. The International Red Cross uses French as the official language. French is one of the 6 languages of communication in the UN. Some people claim that French is the language of romance and diplomacy.

Listening to music is fundamental to musical understanding. By learning to listen critically, our children will not only expand their musical horizons but also gain a deeper understanding of how music is constructed and the impact it can have on the listener. Listening to a broad range of music also helps develop other areas of musical activity, including composing and performing. Therefore, each half term we focus on a 'music of the half term' which is explored through assemblies and further listening opportunities.

This half term, we will be focussing on Pop music, specifically exploring 1970s Disco artists – one of the most famous being ABBA – which links to the upcoming Eurovision Song Contest. which links to the Eurovision Song Contest.

Please continue to report concerns to us in order for us to also support the children.




Spotlight on the Curriculum - Reading


Reading continues to be an important part of school life. Many children are participating in the Sheffield Book Awards and look forward to voting for their favourite book within their age group. The reading library continues to be a great success. Children visit the library with their class and enjoy the opportunity to read around the reading tree! In class, children frequently share books that they have read for pleasure. They complete a 'bookshelf' which shows the genres that they typically enjoy reading. Buddy Reading, where Year 3 and Year 6 pupils read together, is a highlight of the week. The children continue to enjoy sharing books together.



Year 3 children are reading Onyeka and the Academy of the Sun, a super hero story which is set in Nigeria. The book includes themes of trust, loyalty and self-sacrifice which the children have enjoyed discussing. Alongside exposing children to a wide range of texts, children are taught how to answer specific types of comprehension questions to develop their understanding as well as their love of reading.



In Year 4, The Creakers - by Tom Fletcher - is a huge success. As part of reading lessons across school, children frequently complete visualisation activities which support them in picturing a setting or character based on the text. In addition to class readers, we use First News articles to support children's understand of current events. This always sparks interesting discussions!





Spotlight on the Curriculum - Reading (continued)

In Upper Key Stage 2, the Year 5s have recently finished A Romani Story. The story is based in Sheffield during the 1800s and shines a light on the challenges that different communities face. After finishing a text, children enjoy creating book reviews and giving it an all-important star rating.

Year 6 are tackling the challenging text Pig Heart Boy, by Malorie Blackman. This has generated lots of discussion around morals as well as linking well with the project 'How do our bodies work and grow?'. Last half term, the children read a moving novel called Once, about a Jewish child during the Second World War.

Learning in Action

Year 3

This week in Maths we have been doing some collaborative learning about time and learning how to tell the minutes past and minutes to the hour.





We also checked on our sunflower plants. In Science, we have been growing them from seed for several weeks and observing their growth. We know from another plant experiment that they need sunlight, soil and water to grow well. It seems we have looked after the plants well! In Art, we made compositions from natural objects to inspire us in our printing project.

The next day, we spent lots of time exploring the woods and playing outdoor games at Champion House. We went on a scavenger hunt and created our own habitats for animals. Last week, in Maths, we enjoyed an active, outdoor lesson learning about coordinates with human-sized coordinate grids on the playground. Then, we put that knowledge into practice in our PE lessons where we were working in teams following directions around a grid of cones.

Then, on Tuesday and Wednesday, we had our open classrooms where adults and children alike enjoyed making the tallest earthquake-resistant structure. Here are some examples:




